- 1897 May 10 Marconi sends the first ever wireless communication over open sea with the message "Are you ready" transmitted from Lavernock Point in South Wales to the island of Flat Holm.
- 1897 May 15 L&SWR opens Tipton St John-Budleigh Salterton.
- 1897 May 20 Death of John Ramsbottom, locomotive engineer, L&NWR (Alderley Edge) (b. 1814).
- 1897 May 22 London County Council opens Blackwall Tunnel, the world's longest subaqueous road tunnel at this date.
- 1897 May 24 Thomas Tilling Ltd invites applications for shares.
- 1897 May c. Plynlimon & Hafan Tramway opens on 2 ft 3 in (686 mm) gauge to mineral traffic. (Trial passenger working Aug 19.)

- 1897 Aug 27 Hundred of Manhood & Selsey Tramways opens Chichester-Selsey.

1922 Jan 1 Lancashire & Yorkshire Rly merged into L&NWR (with George Hughes as CME; agreed by Railway Amalgamation Tribunal Nov 20, 1921); Shropshire Union absorbed by L&NWR (agreed by Railway Amalgamation Tribunal Dec 29 with retrospective effect).

- 1922 Jan 1 GWR (Western Group) Preliminary Amalgamation Scheme comes into effect (retrospectively approved Mar 25): Alexandra Docks, Cambrian, Cardiff, Rhymney and Taff Vale Rlys merged into GWR. Barry Rly merged under terms of scheme approved May 8. Companies absorbed into GWR on this date include Rhondda & Swansea Bay (approved May 9), Brecon & Merthyr (<?Jul 1>approved Jul 27), Bury Port & Gwendreath Valley (approved Jul 24) and Neath & Brecon (approved Jul 1).
- 1922 Jan 1 C.B. Collett succeeds G.J. Churchward as GWR CME.
- 1922 Jan 1 Transport and General Workers' Union formed by merger of fourteen smaller unions under its first general secretary Ernest Bevin, forming by far the largest trade union.
- 1922 Jan 2 SR opens Sheerness-on-Sea spur.
- 1922 Jan 14 Handley Page O/10 G-EATN flying from Croydon crashes on approach to Paris-Le Bourget airport (all 5 onboard killed).
- 1922 Feb 11 "Clones affray": gun battle at Clones railway station between Irish Republic Army volunteers and members of the Ulster Special Constabulary travelling to Belfast (5 killed).
- 1922 Feb 28 Viscount Lascelles and Princess Mary travel by GWR Paddington–Shifnal on honeymoon.
- 1922 Mar 1 Railway common user of wagons extended to 4-wheel single and twin bolster wagons.
- 1922 Mar 1 Civil Aviation Authority established.
- 1922 Mar 9 Newell's Express Motor Service, predecessor of Seaview Services, licences its first vehicles on the Isle of Wight for a Seaview–Ryde bus operation.
- 1922 Mar 21 L&SWR opens rebuilt Waterloo station officially.
- 1922 Mar 28 Death of Leo Daft, pioneer of electric traction in the US (US) (b. Birmingham, England 1843).
- 1922 Mar 30 Welsh Highland Rly Light Railway Order incorporates WHR which (retrospectively from Jan 1) takes over assets of Portmadoc, Beddgelert & South Snowdon Rly.
- 1922 Apr 1 Midlands & Coast Canal Carriers established by Noah Hingley & Sons of Netherton Ironworks in lieu of Shropshire Union carrying.
- 1922 Apr 1 Irish Post Office takes over responsibilities for its own operations.
- 1922 Apr 7 Picardie mid-air collision: Daimler Airway de Havilland DH.18 G-EAWO flying Croydon— Paris collides in poor visibility with a Cie des Grands Express Aériens Farman Goliath on the reverse journey over France, the world's first such accident (all 7 onboard both aircraft killed).
- 1922 Apr 17 West Riding Automobile Services begins motor bus operation as a subsidiary of the Yorkshire (West Riding) Electric Tramways Co., using Bristol vehicles.
- 1922 Apr 24 First section of Imperial Wireless Chain inaugurated, Leafield (Oxfordshire)-Cairo.
- 1922 Apr Sand Hutton Light Rly opens to Kissthorns and Claxton on 18 in. (460 mm) gauge to freight.
- 1922 May 15 Instone Air Line begins Croydon–Brussels flights (from Oct 1 extended to Cologne Butzweilerhof).
- 1922 May 20 P&O liner ss *Egypt* outbound from Tilbury sinks in English Channel off Ushant after collision in fog with ss *Seine* (86 killed).
- 1922 May 25 Cunard liner RMS *Laconia* sets out on her maiden transatlantic voyage from Southampton.
- 1922 Jun 22 GER war memorial at Liverpool Street station unveiled by FM Sir Henry Wilson, assassinated soon afterwards.
- 1922 Jun 28 Irish Civil War breaks out: railways will be a major target.

- 1922 Jul 1 GWR&Midland Rly last operate Hotwells Halt–Sneyd Park Junction in Bristol; line closed for construction of Portway road.
- 1922 Jul 10 L&NWR introduces electric services over 'New Line' Willesden Junction–Watford Junction to replace steam passenger services.
- 1922 Jul 10 Birkenhead–Margate and Cardiff–Brighton through rail passenger services commence.
- 1911 Jul 11 Convention Relating to the Regulation of Aerial Navigation comes into effect.
- 1922 Jul 21 Austin Seven car launched.

- 1922 Jul c. Burwell & District Motor Services begins bus operation.
- 1922 Aug 5 A.G. Partridge introduces his Chocolate Express bus operation, the first London independent ("pirate") motor bus service.
- 1922 Aug 8 Rail and road viaducts at Ballyvoile, Co. Waterford, blown up by Irish Republican Army.
- 1922 Aug 21 SECR Milton Range accident: passengers run down and collision in rear following signal passed at danger in fog (5 killed).
- 1922 by Aug Dodge Brothers begin assembly of imported car and commercial components in Fulham.
- 1922 Sep 9 Birth of Tom Cowie, motor vehicle dealer (Sunderland) (d. 2012).
- 1922 Sep Peak Forest Canal carries last commercial load of limestone from Bugsworth basin.
- 1922 Oct 2 Barquentine *Cutty Sark** returns (under tow) from Portuguese ownership to Falmouth in the ownership of Capt. Wilfred Dowman for restoration to her original clipper appearance as a museum and static cadet training ship.
- 1922 Oct 9 R. Chisnell & Sons Ltd (King Alfred Motor Services of Winchester) begin their first stage carriage services.
- 1922 Oct 16 Second Simplon Tunnel opens.
- 1922 Oct 18 British Broadcasting Company formed. On Nov 14 it takes over London station 2LO (established May 11 by Marconi).

- 1922 Dec Snailbeach District Rlys (horse worked at this time) purchased by Col. H.F. Stephens personally.
- 1922 -- Birth of R.C. Riley, railway photographer (d. 2009).
